
## 1 LITERATURE REVIEW

harmonious and visually pleasing environments that align with the functional needs and preferences of the occupants.



In the study by Hayles (2015), The survey indicates that a substantial 70% (21 out of 30) of these suppliers offer products incorporating identifiable Green, Sustainable, and Fair Trade (GSFT) materials. Examples of GSFT materials encompass a diverse range, including organic cotton, bamboo, and hemp for plant and animal fibers. Synthetic fibers and recycled content are represented by recycled ceramic, porcelain, and glass tiles, as well as eco-friendly options like recycled polyesters and blended 'wool' derived from recycled materials. The inclusion of low VOC paints, products incorporating Forest Stewardship Council (FSC) and rapid renewable resources in floor covering, wall coverings, and fabric blends, and the presence of

Fair-Trade offerings from retailers, particularly in the floor coverings sector, further underscore the industry's commitment to sustainable and ethically sourced materials.


**Figure 5:** Processes and Components of Ethical Sourcing of Raw Materials (Schrijverset al., 2019)

### 1.4 Theoretical Framework




**Figure 7:** Diffusion of Innovation Theory (Rogers, 1962).
